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## *The Clery Act Annual Security Report Calendar Year 2008*

In 1991, the U.S. Congress passed the Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act, which requires colleges to report the three previous years of crime statistics and campus security information and policies. The act was amended in 1992, 1998 and 2000. In October 1998, President Clinton signed an amendment renaming the act the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act and requiring that crimes motivated by hate or bias be included in the statistics. In 2008, the Higher Education Opportunity Act added additional requirements for reporting, including but not limited to: emergency response and evacuation procedures, expanding the list of crimes motivated by hate or bias, reporting of fire safety information, and establishing a missing student notification policy.

The Clery Act requires institutions to disclose three general categories of crime statistics:

- Types of Offenses - Criminal Homicide, including:
  - Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter
  - Negligent Manslaughter
  - Sex Offenses, including:
    - forcible
    - non-forcible
  - Robbery
  - Aggravated Assault
  - Burglary
  - Motor Vehicle Theft
  - Arson
  
- Hate Crimes
  - Any of the above-mentioned offenses
  - Larceny-Theft
  - Simple Assault
  - Intimidation
  - Vandalism of Property
  
- Arrests and Referrals for Disciplinary Action for:
  - Illegal weapons possession
  - Violation of drug and liquor laws

The University of Kansas recognizes the importance for an institution of higher learning to develop and maintain a safe and secure environment in which the academic and social pursuits of its members can be fully realized. The university has the utmost concern for the success of each student and endeavors to allow each student maximum freedom to live his/her life free from interference. With this freedom, however, each student is responsible to be an active participant in the exercise of personal safety. While the University of Kansas strives to provide a safe environment, criminal incidents and other emergencies may occur despite reasonable efforts.

No community's security plan can attain maximum effectiveness unless everyone contributes to making it work. Safety and security are both personal and shared responsibilities. The university encourages all crimes to be reported to its Office of Public Safety. By accepting this responsibility members of the university community foster a safe and secure academic environment.

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## **REPORTING CRIME**

### **How to report crimes and other emergencies occurring on the Lawrence campus**

Preventing campus crime is a shared responsibility between the university and the campus community. In case of a crime or other emergency, students, faculty, staff and visitors are expected to notify the KU Office of Public Safety. If you suspect that a crime is being committed, call the KU Office of Public Safety at 785-864-5900 or 911. Their offices are located just west of 15<sup>th</sup> Street and Iowa Street at the corner of Bob Billings Parkway and Crestline Road. The Office of Public Safety responds to calls by dispatching an officer to meet with the caller. If assistance is required from the Lawrence Police Department or the Lawrence/Douglas County Fire and Medical Department, the Office of Public Safety will contact the appropriate unit. If a sexual assault or rape should occur, staff on the scene, including Public Safety Officer, will offer the victim a wide variety of services. ### **KU Office of Public Safety**

The Office of Public Safety is comprised of 29 commissioned University police officers, 9 communications operators, 10 uniformed security officers, and 12 student security monitors. University police officers receive their law enforcement authority from Kansas Statutes Annotated (K.S.A.) 76-726. Every University police officer is certified as a Law Enforcement Officer in the State of Kansas and receives basic law enforcement training from the Kansas Law Enforcement Training Academy. Officers receive a minimum of 40 hours of in-service training each year to maintain their state certification.

The Office of Public Safety operates a Community Support Section which provides educational programs, materials and services on an on-going basis and on demand for the entire campus community. These include KU Crime Stoppers, equipment engraving, and personal safety educational programs. Information on specific campus crimes and overall crime statistics are made available and published in campus and area media to make members of the campus community aware of the environment in which they work and study. Based upon this information, students, faculty, and staff are expected to make reasonable decisions about their own security.

The Office of Public Safety has both full time and part time security officers. Security personnel are responsible for monitoring entrances, unlocking and locking designated buildings, and performing routine laboratory and building inspections for fire and safety-related problems. Security personnel also patrol buildings and campus grounds to report suspicious activity and unsafe conditions.

The Communication Center provides emergency and non-emergency call taking and dispatching services for the University community, to include police, fire and medical, safety and security, maintenance, and parking services. In a support role, our Communications Center functions as a backup to the Douglas County Emergency Communication Center. The KU Communication Center can dispatch fire or emergency medical service and communicates with local and state police agencies as needed.

The Communications Center maintains radio and/or telephone contact with all Douglas County Emergency Services agencies: KU Police, Lawrence Police, Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Kansas Highway Patrol, and Lawrence/Douglas County Fire/Medical departments. Personnel working in the Communications Center also handle additional radio traffic for other University departments, including Facilities Operations, Parking Services, and the University-wide Security Network.

The University has closed circuit security cameras located around all major residence halls and parking lots. There are more than eighty emergency (blue) phones on campus that upon being picked up, dial the 911 operators on campus.

The Office of Public Safety uses the Kansas Standard Offense Report:

- to record criminal activity
- to tabulate and report crimes to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation
- to compile the Annual Security Report.

The Office of Public Safety does make a provision for including confidential reports of crime in this Annual Security Report.

**Complete Campus Crime Statistics**

The KU Office of Public Safety annually produces a comprehensive set of crime data for the campus. This list is in addition to those statistics provided in the Annual Safety Report. **Police Authority and Jurisdiction**

The police officers employed by the Office of Public Safety are certified law enforcement officers in the State of Kansas, and have full power of arrest. Kansas law (K.S.A. 76-726 and 21-2401a) provides for jurisdictional authority of university police officers to include property owned or operated by the University, endowment association, alumni association, athletic association or recognized student organizations. It also allows for jurisdictional authority on streets, property and highways immediately adjacent to campus and within Lawrence when officers are following up on crimes committed on campus.

In addition, the City of Lawrence and the University of Kansas have a jurisdiction agreement that allows university police officers to exercise police authority in areas of the city off campus when the officer has probable cause to believe a violation of law is occurring. The agreement (pursuant to K.S.A. 22-2401a) authorizes the university police officer to exercise all power and authority as may lawfully be exercised by a Lawrence police officer, until such time as a Lawrence police officer is able to respond.

The Office of Public Safety is responsible for investigating criminal cases, enforcing traffic laws, and University rules and regulations. All reported crimes are investigated immediately. Follow-up investigation occurs to identify the criminal(s). Completed investigations are presented to either the City of Lawrence Municipal Court or Douglas County District Court for adjudication. Information concerning criminal activity occurring on campus is shared with campus

administration when appropriate. Victims and witnesses are strongly encouraged to report criminal activity to the Office of Public Safety.

### **KU Office of Public Safety and Local, State and Federal Law Enforcement**

The Office of Public Safety works closely with the Lawrence Police Department on a daily basis. In addition to sharing crime information, both departments have the ability to ask for immediate assistance through a shared radio communication system, as well as a direct phone line between the KU Emergency Communications Center and the Douglas County Emergency Communication Center. Cooperative investigations with and referrals to Lawrence Police are done as appropriate. The Lawrence Police Department monitors and records criminal activity on public property surrounding campus and at fraternities and sororities, and provides this information to the University for inclusion in its crime statistics, as required by the Clery Act.

The Office of Public Safety maintains a working relationship with other local, state and federal law enforcement agencies including the Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Kansas Bureau of Investigation, Kansas Highway Patrol and Federal Bureau of Investigation (Kansas City and Topeka field offices). Administrators with the Office of Public Safety maintain periodic contact with administrators from other law enforcement agencies, and information is shared with these agents as needed.

### **Confidential Reporting of Crime**

Confidential reporting is allowed at the University. If, for a personal reason, a person does not wish to report an on-campus crime or suspected crime to the police, that person may anonymously report it to the Crime Stoppers Program operated by the Office of Public Safety. Additionally, crime can be anonymously reported through the Crime Statistics Report Form found on the Vice Provost for Student Success web site: [www.vpss.ku.edu/cleryact/csrform.shtml](http://www.vpss.ku.edu/cleryact/csrform.shtml).

A victim may also report information about a crime to the Office of Public Safety and may ask that a criminal report not be filed. Whenever a University official becomes aware of a sexual assault, the assault is reported to the KU Office of Human Resources and Equal Opportunity. A "University official" is defined as "any person who has the authority and the duty to take action or respond to particular issues on behalf of the institution."

### **Crimes Disclosed to Pastoral or Mental Health Counselor**

To be exempt from disclosing reported offenses, pastoral or professional counselors must be acting in their roles of pastoral or professional counselors. This exemption does not relieve counselors of the duty to exercise reasonable care to protect a foreseeable victim from danger posed by the person being counseled. When speaking to a victim or witness to a crime, counselors are encouraged to inform the individual to report the crime to the police.

A pastoral counselor is a person who is associated with a religious order or denomination, is recognized by that religious order or denomination as someone who provides confidential counseling, and is functioning within the scope of that recognition as a pastoral counselor.

A mental health counselor is a person whose official responsibilities include providing mental health counseling to members of the institution's community and who is functioning within the scope of his or her license or certification. This definition applies even to professional counselors who are not employees of the institution, but are under contract to provide counseling at the institution.

### **Timely Warning and Emergency Response**

A timely report to members of the campus community is made of an occurrence of any crime (not only those specified by the Clery Act) considered to be a threat to students and employees that is reported to campus security or local law enforcement agencies. The issuing of a timely warning is decided on a case-by-case basis by the Office of Public Safety in light of all the facts surrounding a crime, including factors of the nature of the crime, the continuing danger to the campus community and the possible risk of compromising law enforcement efforts. Crimes specified by the Clery Act are found in the Definitions section of this report.

Timely warnings can be announced through written Crime Alerts and/or through the emergency notification system. Crime Alerts are produced by the Office of Public Safety, sent to administration offices on campus and Student Housing for its distribution within the housing facilities, and posted on University bulletin boards and the website of the Office of Public Safety. If there is an immediate threat to the KU community, KU uses its multi-tiered emergency notification system. The policy for Evacuating Campus Facilities is found at: <https://documents.ku.edu/policies/provost/EvacuatingFacilities.htm>.

The emergency notification system includes:

- Text messaging: Cell phone text messages alerting recipients to emergency situations and campus closures.
- Public address system: The system allows emergency dispatchers in the 911 center to provide real-time voice messages to an individual building, a group of buildings or to all equipped buildings. The public address system includes most classroom and gathering spaces on campus.
- E-mail alerts: The University has established an emergency broadcast e-mail system to reach KU e-mail accounts.
- Voice mail: Faculty and staff with voice mail-equipped phones can receive a broadcast voice mail message.
- KU web site: [www.alert.ku.edu](http://www.alert.ku.edu) provides emergency preparedness information and is the central location for updates during a crisis.

### **Daily Crime Log**

Federal law requires every university that maintains a police or security department of any kind “shall make, keep, and maintain a daily log, written in a form that can be easily understood, recording all crimes reported to such police or security department” to include the nature, date, time and general location of each crime and the disposition of the complaint, if known. The law requires that this initial information be open for public inspection within two business days of the report of the crime unless the release of the information would jeopardize an ongoing investigation, cause a suspect to flee or result in the destruction of evidence. New information about entries must be made available within two business days.

Criminal offenses reported to the KU Public Safety Office are written using the Kansas Standard Offense Report form. All completed reports are reviewed by police supervisors, who input data

Criminal offenses reported to the KU Public Safety Office are written using the Kansas Standard Offense Report form. All completed reports are reviewed by police supervisors, who input data from the Kansas Standard Offense Report form into the Crime Log database. Extraction of that data and uploading of it to the Daily Crime Log is done every business day. If a specific day is not listed, then no crimes were reported on that day. The Daily Crime Log does not include non-criminal reports, accidents or traffic law violations. The disposition of the crime is “case open, investigation continuing, with available information” unless indicated otherwise in the entry.

### **Registered Sex Offenders**

A federal law, the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act amendment to the Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act, requires registered sex offenders to indicate when they are enrolled or employed at institutions of higher learning. The law further requires the state law enforcement authority the Kansas Bureau of Investigation to provide the University of Kansas Public Safety Office with a list of registered sex offenders who have indicated that they are either enrolled or employed at the University of Kansas-Lawrence campus.

## **SAFETY AND SECURITY POLICIES AND PROGRAMS**

### **Weapons on Campus Policy**

In accordance with Board of Regents policy, the University prohibits students, employees, and visitors from possessing, carrying or using weapons on property owned by or under the control of the University. Violations of this policy may result in disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal of employees or expulsion of students. Violators also may be asked to leave University property, and if they refuse to do so, such refusal may constitute an unlawful trespass. ### **Racial and Ethnic Harassment Policy**

The University of Kansas, Lawrence, is committed to programs and activities that are free of racial or ethnic discrimination. To carry out the mission of this institution, the university community must provide and maintain a working and learning environment that fosters respect among all members of the community. The university’s goal is to provide an environment where individuals are free to develop intellectually, personally, professionally, and socially without intimidation or fear. Intimidation and harassment affect not only those who suffer the harassment but also the entire community. Racial and ethnic discrimination is a violation of federal and state law, including Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Kansas Acts Against Discrimination. The full policy is here:

**Sexual Harassment Policy**

Sexual harassment is a violation of professional ethics as well as a violation of federal and state law. Specifically, sexual harassment is a form of illegal discrimination in violation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and the Kansas Acts Against Discrimination. **Alcohol and Drug Use Policy**

The drinking age in Kansas is 21. State law deals strongly with underage drinking, and makes it a crime to furnish alcohol to underage individuals. University policy and enforcement procedures are in full compliance with the law.

The University of Kansas prohibits the unlawful possession, use, manufacture, or distribution of alcohol or drugs by students and employees on its property or as part of its activities. Any student or employee found to be using, possessing, manufacturing or distributing controlled substances or alcohol in violation of the law on University property or at University events shall be subject to disciplinary action in accordance with applicable policies of the State of Kansas, the Board of Regents and the University of Kansas. For employees, the University will take appropriate personnel action for such infractions up to and including termination. Students who violate this policy will be subject to sanctions which include suspension and expulsion from the University. The University of Kansas Policy on Prevention of Illegal Drug and Alcohol Use on Campus and in the Workplace is available on the KU web page, is distributed annually to all employees, and is available in the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success. ### **Parental Notification Policy for Drug and Alcohol Violations**

The University of Kansas will notify the parent/legal guardian of a student enrolled on the Lawrence campus who is under 21 years of age:

- Following the first known violation of University policy or State Law regarding drugs. The notification will be in writing.
- Following the first known violation of University policy or State law regarding alcohol, when the use of alcohol has
  - a) placed the student in a life-threatening situation as determined by an attending medical professional. The notification will be by telephone.
  - b) endangered the health or welfare of another person, including any report by police of arrest for driving on campus while under the influence of alcohol. The notification will be in writing.
- Following the second known violation of University policy or State Law regarding alcohol. The notification will be made in writing.
- Following a violation of University policy or State Law regarding alcohol or other drugs that results in the cancellation of the student's University housing contract. The notification will be made by telephone.
- Following the student's referral to CAPS and/or DCCCA for an alcohol assessment through the Mandatory Alcohol Assessment policy. The notification will be made in writing.

In addition, the University of Kansas will notify the parent/legal guardian of any student enrolled on the Lawrence campus, *regardless of age*, when there is a life-threatening situation as determined by an attending medical professional, unless the student specifically instructs the medical professional at that time not to notify his/her parent/legal guardian. This notification will be made by telephone.

The University will notify the parent/legal guardian as outlined above using the contact information that is provided by the student and stored in the University's student administration (Enroll & Pay) computer system. Students are prompted to update this contact information each semester. If no contact information is available or it is incorrect, the University will make a reasonable effort to contact the parent/legal guardian.

Students will be referred to the Student Health Services Wellness Resource Center for alcohol education sanctions as a result of a student conduct process or as referred by an off-campus entity who seeks assistance for a student related to alcohol or drug abuse. Unless there are extenuating circumstances, the first referral requires the student to complete the online program "Under the Influence" at a current cost of \$40, payable in advance. When the student is referred a second time, or when there are extenuating circumstances, the student must complete the 90-minute "Choices" education program at a current cost of \$60, payable in advance. The parent/legal guardian will be notified in writing of the student's required participation in this program.

Students found responsible for a second violation of University or State drug policies or a third violation of University or State alcohol policies will be subject to further sanctions as provided by University Code.

The services provided by the Wellness Resource Center are available to all University residences, fraternities, sororities and to off-campus residences, regardless of the age of the student.

### **Amnesty Policy**

University of Kansas students seeking immediate medical assistance on behalf of persons experiencing alcohol-related emergencies will not be sanctioned for violations of University and/or Department of Student Housing alcohol-related policies.

This program is designed to promote the health and safety of our community. Any student who abuses this policy can be subject to disciplinary action for impeding the orderly process of the University.

The University provides drug and alcohol abuse education. The University subscribes to e-CHUG which is a self-assessment that provides students with accurate, detailed, and personalized feedback on use of alcohol. The Student Health Services offers a certified peer educator program that helps with wellness education programs and promotions.

The Department of Student Housing does not allow alcohol in its residence halls, scholarship halls, or Jayhawker Towers. Student Housing provides alcohol education programs to its residents on a voluntary basis or as a requirement when disciplinary action has occurred for violation of its policy. In addition, there are other alcohol education organizations on campus, such as Alcoholics Anonymous.

Many organizations affiliated with the university have their own unique policies and procedures. For example, Kansas Athletics Inc., has its own screening program for substance abuse for

Many organizations affiliated with the university have their own unique policies and procedures. For example, Kansas Athletics Inc., has its own screening program for substance abuse for student athletes. The Interfraternity Council and the Panhellenic Association govern fraternities and sororities and have established alcohol policies for their members.

Employees can receive assistance through Human Resources and Equal Opportunity, including LIFELINE, a voluntary, confidential, free service that provides employees and their immediate family with professional counseling and referral services. ### **Campus Facilities and Grounds**

The University of Kansas is committed to maintaining an environment in which students, faculty, staff, and guests can work without interference. The University of Kansas is a public institution and many areas and facilities of the campus are open to the general public and their use is encouraged. Vehicular access to central campus is limited during business hours by traffic control stations at entry points. Campus buildings are open during regular hours as published in the University Directory. Access to some buildings, including student housing units, is limited to those with proper identification.

Use of campus facilities for meetings, speakers and other events is governed by the Guidelines for University Events and Registered Organizations under the authority of the University Events Committee and the Student Organizations and Leadership Development Center. Policies of the Board of Regents also limit the use of campus facilities for fund raising and political events.

The Office of Public Safety has both full- time and part- time security officers. Security personnel are responsible for monitoring entrances, unlocking and locking designated buildings, and performing routine fire and safety-related inspections of laboratories and buildings. Security personnel also patrol buildings and campus grounds to report suspicious activity and unsafe condition

The University staffs an Office of Design and Construction Management which is charged with the responsibility of designing and constructing campus facilities in compliance with applicable codes. It also oversees the campus lighting plan as well as the design and construction standards for all KU buildings. The Department of Facilities Operations is responsible for maintaining buildings and grounds. Facilities Operations Grounds Crew regularly trims trees, shrubs, and other vegetation to ensure that exterior lights are not blocked. Any exterior doors found to be malfunctioning are reported Facilities Operations for immediate attention. Any concerns about or suggestions for campus safety improvement can be submitted to the Office of Public Safety (864-5900) as well as to the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success (864-4060).

The Student Senate has a Campus Safety Advisory Board that works with the University administration to maintain a safety environment. The Campus Safety Advisory Board advises the University on student safety concerns and provides some funding for improvements.

The campus is regularly inspected by the Kansas Fire Marshal's Office. Additionally, KU has its own Fire Marshall. KU's Department of Environment, Health and Safety is committed to aiding the campus in the protection of human health, safety and the environment in a manner that enhances the quality of education, research and public service on campus.

## **PERSONAL SAFETY TIPS**

### **At home**

- Install quality locks on doors, windows and sliding glass doors.
- Keep doors locked, even when at home.
- Install and use peepholes.
- Don't leave keys hidden under mats, above the door or near the door.
- Leave lights or a radio on a timer to give the appearance that someone is home.

### **On campus**

- Know where the emergency (blue) phones are on campus to call for immediate help.
- For a safe ride home, call Safe Ride at (785) 864-SAFE.
- If living on campus, don't leave rooms unlocked even if occupied or when nearby.
- Do not attach anything to key rings that indicate place of residence.
- If your instincts tell you something's wrong, trust them and get away.
- When in a public place, keep valuable possessions out of sight. If you must leave an area for any length of time, take personal items with you.

### **In relationships**

- When going out with someone new, go on a group date or meet in a public place
- Arrange your own transportation to and from dates
- Alert friends/family to where you will be going
- If drinking, be mindful of how alcohol can impair decision making

### **On the streets**

- Walk in well-lit areas and be aware of surroundings
- Walk with another person.
- Use your cell phone judiciously – don't let it distract you
- Carry your car keys when approaching your vehicle so you can enter quickly.
- Call ahead when driving or walking to your hall or apartment late at night and have someone watch you walk from your car to the residence.

**Safe Ride and Safe Bus**

SafeRide is a fare- free transportation service for KU students that operates from 10:30 p.m. to 2:30 a.m. every evening during the academic year. The intent of the SafeRide program is to provide KU students with safe transportation to their residence.

SafeBus operates Fridays and Saturdays from 9 p.m. to 3 a.m. while school is in session. Six accessible buses will be covering three separate routes; with two buses on each route. All rules that apply to daily KU on Wheels and Park & Ride routes also apply to SafeBus. Each bus is equipped with 6 security cameras for rider safety.

The SafeRide and Safe Bus program are run by KU on Wheels. It is funded by the SafeRide student fee, and promotional materials are partially funded by the Kansas Drunk Driving Prevention Office, through grants from the Kansas Department of Transportation.

**KU - Operated Housing Security****Residence Hall Access**

Our residential units are locked 24/7 and Student Housing staff are available around the clock to help maintain a safe environment. In consideration of and respect for residents' privacy, security, and property, all halls are secured and all exterior doors locked 24 hours a day. Residents may enter their assigned residence hall by using their KU Card at designated card reader doors. Each hall's main entrance is equipped with card readers and can be accessed 24 hours a day. Some halls have additional card reader doors which can be accessed between 7:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. After 11:00 p.m., residents may only enter through the main entrance and must present their KU Card. Guests must present photo identification and at all times be escorted by a resident of the hall.

**Scholarship Hall Access**

In consideration of and respect for residents' privacy, security, and property, all Scholarship halls are secured and all exterior doors locked 24 hours a day. Residents are able to access their Scholarship hall by using a code and/or their KU Card. This code should not be shared with non-residents of the hall.

**Jayhawker Towers Access**

In consideration of and respect for residents' privacy, security, and property, all Towers are secured and all interior glass doors locked 24 hours a day. Residents are able to access their Tower by using their KU Card at designated card reader doors. Visitors should be met by their host at the interior glass door and escorted throughout the duration of their stay.

In addition, each apartment entrance door has been equipped with deadbolt and chain locks. Residents should deadbolt their apartments each time they leave.

### **Stouffer Place and Sunflower Apartment Access**

Each apartment entrance door has been equipped with a deadbolt lock. Residents should deadbolt their apartments each time they leave.

### **Fraternity and Sorority Housing Security**

Fraternity and sorority houses are located off campus; these residences are privately owned by alumni/ae associations. Criminal activity within these units falls under the jurisdiction of the Lawrence Police Department. Houses have building keys or combination locks, and the majority of chapters have a house director in residence. Security and access policies of these off-campus organized living groups are determined by those individual groups. The Interfraternity Council and Panhellenic Association govern fraternities and sororities and set policies on alcohol use, hazing, and other issues. The Student Involvement and Leadership Center provides support to these student organizations and can be reached at (785) 864-4681.

### **Student Conduct Program**

All students are governed by The Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities (the Code). Sanctions for violations of the code are outlined in Article 22. The complete conduct code is found at:

Information on how due process is provided is found at: [www.vpss.ku.edu/pdf/guide.pdf](http://www.vpss.ku.edu/pdf/guide.pdf). The Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success administers the Code. Both the accused and the victim are informed of the outcome and sanctions imposed under the Code resulting from a crime of violence or sexual offenses.

### **Sanctions for violations of the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities include:**

- **Warning:** Notice in writing that continuation or repetition of conduct found wrongful, within a period of time stated in the warning, may be cause for more severe disciplinary action.
- **Restitution:** Reimbursement for damage to or misappropriation of property. This may take the form of appropriate service or other compensation.
- **Fine:** A money payment to a designated University fund.
- **Disciplinary Probation:** Disciplinary probation shall have as its purpose the rehabilitation of the student or organization and may include suspension of specified privileges for a definite period not to exceed two years. Disciplinary probation may also require the student or organization to participate in specified activities, including one counseling information session, or may prescribe any program which is deemed just and fair under the circumstances of the case. The authority imposing this sanction may assign any qualified person within the University community, other than an undergraduate student, to act as a probation supervisor. The probation supervisor shall report periodically to the appointing authority. If the probation supervisor should report that the student is not fulfilling probation requirements, the case will be reviewed by the appointing authority and remaining members of the original hearing panel, who may recommend additional sanctions.
- **Campus/Community Service:** Students or organizations may be required to complete a specified number of service hours to an identified campus or community agency. The authority imposing this sanction may assign any qualified person to serve as the service supervisor. If the service supervisor should report that the student or organization has not fulfilled the service requirements, the case will be reviewed as in Article 22 E.4.

- **Student Suspension:** Exclusion from classes and other University privileges and activities as set out in the order after a hearing, for a definite period not to exceed two years. The conditions of re-admission shall be stated in the order of the suspension.
- **Organization Suspension:** Exclusion from University privileges and activities as set out in the order after a hearing, for a definite period not to exceed two years. The conditions of reinstatement shall be stated in the order of suspension.
- **Student Expulsion:** Termination of student status for a minimum of two years. The conditions of re-admission, if any, shall be stated in the order of expulsion.
- **Removal of Organization Registration:** Termination of registered organization status for a minimum of two years. The conditions of re-admission, if any, shall be stated in the order of removal of registration.

### **SPECIFIC SAFETY RELATED PROGRAMS FOR 2008**

The University's work on campus safety is not limited to physical improvements. There are numerous programs that promote safe living at the University.

#### **The Office of Public Safety**

Every year the University of Kansas Public Safety Office presents a variety of programs to the University community. In 2008, Public Safety offered 58 safety related programs on the Lawrence campus and 3 programs at the Edwards campus. Additionally Public Safety participated in the New Student Orientation program presenting the "Making Safe Choices" program 24 times.

#### **The Emily Taylor Women's Resource Center**

The Sexual Assault Prevention and Education Program is an active component of the ETWRC. The programs deal with personal safety issues, sexual assault as well healthy relationships. SAPEP also provides in-class presentations upon request. During 2008 the SAPEP presented programs that reached a minimum 1535 individual students and distributed over 1000 flyers to local apartment and housing complexes regarding personal safety tips and sexual assault prevention programs.

#### **The Department of Student Housing**

Learning doesn't stop at the classroom door. The Department of Student Housing is committed to providing learning opportunities for students and sponsors many educational programs throughout the academic year. There were programs that had a personal safety as the core of the activity (sexual violence awareness & prevention, sexual safety, self defense, student rights and legal behaviors, cyber safety, and personal safety at spring break). During 2008 there were 25 personal safety programs and 52 alcohol safety programs. There were 20 fire safety programs with the Douglas County Fire and Rescue Department in the residence halls and scholarship halls.

#### **Student Involvement & Leadership Center**

Working with the fraternities and sororities registered with the University, Student Involvement and Leadership Center coordinated programs that dealt with personal safety and alcohol awareness during 2008. Additionally, 130 students attended the Greek Alcohol Forum to discuss the current alcohol policy that has been established by the Greek organization councils.

The individual fraternities and sororities offer fire and safety programs in their houses annually in addition to the personal safety programming.

### **Student Health Services**

Student Health Services Wellness Resource Center provides prevention education and programming focusing on 5 priority health areas, including alcohol and other drugs; tobacco; sexual health; nutrition and physical activity; and stress management. From August 2007-June 2008, the WRC had more than 18,000 contacts with students and parents via presentations, events, and programs and distributed almost 25,000 educational brochures. Many presentations were given to students within University housing, Fraternities & Sororities, and the classroom addressing safety in regards to alcohol and STIs (sexually transmitted infections). Events included Alcohol Awareness, Breast Cancer/Women's Health Awareness, the Great American Smokeout, World AIDS Day, Stress Free Finals, and Safer Spring Break, to name only a few. Programs serving students include Alcohol Educations Sanctions Program, KanUquit Tobacco Cessation Program, and CPR certification. The WRC strives to provide innovative approaches for achieving optimal health and maximizing academic and professional success

### **The Department of Human Resources**

The Department of Human Resources offers a variety of training for KU employees. Those dealing with Workplace Violence are covered through Human Resources in conjunction with the Office of Public Safety. The training sessions cover a variety of topics including: defining workplace violence, statistics, KU and State of Kansas policy issues, conflict management, prevention, and what to do if actually subjected to violence. They also provide classes on civility in the workplace.

### **Department of Environment, Health and Safety**

During calendar year 2008 occupational safety and environmental safety programs were presented periodically with faculty, staff and students learning about work place safety.

### **Office of New Student Orientation**

New Student Orientation works with Student Health Services and the KU Public Safety Office to offer Making Smart Choices. This is a session specifically on safety and health issues of the university student and is offered 19 times through the orientation program. Additionally, the Office of International Students and Scholar Services provides personal safety program as part of a specialized new student orientation.

### **KU Athletics, Inc.**

KU Athletics offers a comprehensive program to promote of student athletic welfare. In 2008 they provided a variety of programs through the "Life Skills for Inter Collegiate Athletics" class and other speakers. Each month there are programs about personal safety or health issues. An Online, interactive alcohol educational program addresses the many high-profile issues associated with high- risk college drinking was provided to the Life Skills classes, Student Athlete Advisory Committee Executive Board, and various teams. Kansas Athletics has the *1A A Division 1A CHAMPS Program of Excellence*. A monthly e-newsletter called the "Beak'Em Bulletin" is sent to student-athletes during the academic year. The newsletter includes regular sections on compliance, nutrition, sport psychology, and leadership/service. Compliance staff members meet with each team at least once a year to provide education about issues including

hazing and gambling. Additionally, KUAC partners with other university offices to offer programs about healthy dating relationships, alcohol free programming, as well as self-defense programs.

### **The Memorial Unions**

The Union offers many programs throughout the year that involve healthy life style choices. The “Unionfest” included presentations on social responsibility including alcohol education & sexual assault awareness.

## **SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION AND RESPONSE PLAN**

You may also report sexual assault to the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success for non-academic disciplinary actions under the Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities. University personnel are required to report sexual assault to the Human Resources and Equal Opportunity office for investigation. The University is willing to work with students who are victims of sexual assault to change academic or living arrangements following an alleged sex offense. For assistance, contact the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success.

There is support for sexual violence survivors in addition to what students will find through the Emily Taylor Women’s Resource Center. The KU Counseling and Psychological Services offers counseling. In the city of Lawrence there is the Rape Victims Survivor Service program of at GaDuGi Safe Center. At any time, you may contact an RVSS advocate at GaDuGi Safe Center available 24 hours a day/7 days a week by calling 785-841-2345 or 785-843-8985 during business hours for assistance obtaining information, referrals to other professionals, and/or continued support. ### **Prevention**

The Emily Taylor Women’s Resource Center has a program devoted to sexual violence prevention. Sexual Violence Prevention Services (SVPS) provides programs, information and assistance on issues related to rape, sexual assault, stalking, domestic violence and other forms of sexual and relationship violence. Workshops are offered to the campus community every semester and are available by request to living groups and student organizations. The University does not tolerate sexual harassment. Sexual assault is a form of harassment. Sexual harassment is a violation of professional ethics as well as a violation of federal and state law. Specifically, sexual harassment is a form of illegal discrimination in violation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and the Kansas Acts Against Discrimination. Any student or employee may initiate a complaint of sexual harassment that occurs on the university premises or at a university-sponsored activity or results from an association within the university community. Visitors and other persons attending university programs, utilizing university facilities, or participating in a university-sponsored activity may also make a sexual harassment complaint. Persons who experience such harassment should carefully document all incidents, noting dates, specific behaviors, and their effect.

# UNIVERSITY RESPONSE PLAN FOR RESPONDING TO INCIDENTS OF SEXUAL ASSAULT

## 1. INTRODUCTION

The University of Kansas prohibits sexual assault.

It has been widely recognized that rape, sexual assault and other forms of sexual violence can be a devastating and painful experience for college students, profoundly impacting their well-being as well as their ability to thrive and succeed in the academic environment. The University of Kansas is committed to providing consistent, compassionate, and comprehensive support to students who are survivors of these crimes to assist in their recovery and maximize their opportunity to achieve their academic goals. It is important to note that there are University and community services that are available to the accused as well (see 1.1 for further information). It is also important to note that, while this plan is focused on students who have been raped or sexually assaulted, the services listed in this document are also available to students who have experienced other forms of sexual violence.

### 1.1 Definition of Terms

The term "rape" refers to a specific behavior that is directed against women only, according to Kansas state law. The term "sexual assault" refers to a range of behaviors that are directed predominately against women, but can also be directed at men. An understanding of the following terms and their implications will provide the framework for a more comprehensive understanding of the issues.

**Rape**, as defined by the Kansas Statutes Annotated (K.S.A. 21-3502) is:

1. Sexual intercourse with a person who does not consent to the sexual intercourse, under any of the following circumstances:
  - a. When the victim is overcome by force or fear;
  - b. When the victim is unconscious or physically powerless; or
  - c. When the victim is incapable of giving consent because of mental deficiency or disease, or when the victim is incapable of giving consent because of the effect of any alcoholic liquor, narcotic, drug, or other substance, which condition was known by the offender or was reasonably apparent to the offender;
2. Sexual intercourse with a child who is under 14 years of age;
3. Sexual intercourse with a victim when the victim's consent was obtained through a knowing misrepresentation made by the offender that the sexual intercourse was a medically or therapeutically necessary procedure; or
4. Sexual intercourse with a victim when the victim's consent was obtained through a knowing misrepresentation made by the offender that the sexual intercourse was a legally required procedure within the scope of the offender's authority.

**Sexual Assault** is not a specific crime but is a term that is often used to refer to a range of sexual offenses identified in the Kansas Statutes Annotated. This includes Aggravated Criminal Sodomy, as well as Aggravated Sexual Battery.

**Aggravated Criminal Sodomy**, as defined by the Kansas Statutes Annotated (K.S.A. 21-3506) is:

1. Sodomy with a child who is under 14 years of age;
2. Causing a child under 14 years of age to engage in sodomy with any person or an animal; or
3. Sodomy with a person who does not consent to the sodomy or causing a person, without the person's consent, to engage in sodomy with any person or an animal, under any of the following circumstances:
  - a. When the victim is overcome by force or fear;
  - b. When the victim is unconscious or physically powerless; or
  - c. When the victim is incapable of giving consent because of mental deficiency or disease, or when the victim is incapable of giving consent because of the effect of any alcoholic liquor, narcotic, drug or other substance, which condition was known by the offender or was reasonably apparent to the offender.

**Sodomy**, as defined by the Kansas Statutes Annotated (K.S.A. 21-3502(2)), means oral contact or oral penetration of the female genitalia or oral contact of the male genitalia; anal penetration, however slight, of a male or female by any body part or object; or oral or anal copulation or sexual intercourse between a person and an animal. Sodomy does not include penetration of the anal opening by a finger or object in the course of the performance of:

1. Generally recognized health care practices; or
2. A body cavity search conducted in accordance with K.S.A. 22-2520 through 22-2524, and amendments thereto (law enforcement or corrections-directed searches).

**Aggravated Sexual Battery**, as defined by the Kansas Statutes Annotated (K.S.A. 21-3518) is:

1. Sodomy with a child who is under 14 years of age;
2. causing a child under 14 years of age to engage in sodomy with any person or an animal; or
3. sodomy with a person who does not consent to the sodomy or causing a person, without the person's consent, to engage in sodomy with any person or an animal, under any of the following circumstances:
  - a. When the victim is overcome by force or fear;
  - b. when the victim is unconscious or physically powerless; or
  - c. when the victim is incapable of giving consent because of mental deficiency or disease, or when the victim is incapable of giving consent because of the effect of any alcoholic liquor, narcotic, drug or other substance, which condition was known by the offender or was reasonably apparent to the offender.

It is important to keep in mind that forced intercourse or other unwanted sexual contact is defined as rape or sexual assault whether the assailant is a stranger to or an acquaintance of the complainant. In addition, intoxication of the assailant does not diminish the assailant's responsibility for sexual assault.

For purposes of brevity, the term "**sexual assault**" will generally be used throughout this document to refer to all the offenses described above. In addition, reports of sexual assault

incidents and individuals accused of committing the offense are considered **allegations** prior to official findings by campus disciplinary or criminal justice proceedings in accordance with procedural due process.

**“Sexual harassment”** – in accordance with the University of Kansas policy “refers to a range of behaviors that may include but are not limited to unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature that affects an individual in academics or the workplace (see [link](#) for further information.). When campus officials have been informed of sexual harassment occurring on campus property, they are required to notify campus authorities to protect the safety of the campus community. At the University of Kansas, sexual assault is considered a form of sexual harassment. The full policy can be viewed at <http://www.hreo.ku.edu/files/documents/SexualHarass.pdf>.

**"Survivor"** refers to an individual who has been raped or sexually assaulted. Unlike the term "victim," which can imply powerlessness and weakness, the term "survivor" is a term associated with empowerment and the assumption of control for one's life after a trauma. Please refer to Section 3 of this plan for services for survivors.

**"Accused"** refers to the individual(s) named as possibly committing the offense. Members of the campus community who are accused of sexual assault can receive information, assistance, and referrals from campus and community agencies, including Counseling and Psychological Services, Department of Student Housing, Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success, Student Involvement and Leadership Center, and Student Legal Services, to name a few.

**“Filing a formal report”** “refers to providing information to initiate an investigation into allegations that an actionable violation/crime has occurred. This is discussed further in 2.1, Step 6.

**“Notification”** of rape or sexual assault refers to the process in which a student tells a campus or community representative about an on- or off-campus incident, regardless of the date of occurrence. Unlike "formal reporting," in which the goal is to pursue disciplinary or legal action against the alleged assailant, “notification” is a mechanism for students who have been sexually assaulted to obtain information, support, and assistance. *When campus representatives have been notified of an incident, they are obligated to notify Human Resources/Equal Opportunity Office (HR/EO) for review to protect both the student and the campus community.* (For more information about reporting options, see sec. 2.1, Step 6).

**"Campus representative"** refers to all University employees. This would also include any undergraduate or graduate student employed by a campus department (e.g., teaching assistant, resident assistant).

**“Sexual Assault Service Coordinators (SASCs)”** refers to trained staff of the Emily Taylor Women’s Resource Center (ETWRC) who provides information, assistance, support and referral to survivors, friends and family to facilitate the recovery process. The Assistant Director of the ETWRC oversees the Sexual Violence Prevention Services (SVPS) and, as such, coordinates the delivery of these services.

## **1.2 Goals of the Campus Plan**

The procedures outlined in this document were created to achieve the following goals:

1. Provide prompt and compassionate support services to reduce the survivor's trauma and promote the healing process.
2. Provide a comprehensive framework in which the needs and decisions of the survivor are central in determining further administrative response and assistance.
3. Create a campus environment that both facilitates and expedites the prompt reporting of sexual assaults, thereby enhancing campus safety.
4. Establish and cultivate a climate of community empowerment and education, in which behaviors that contribute to sexual violence are recognized, understood, and not tolerated.
5. Protect the rights of the survivor, the accused, and other parties involved in or affected by the case.

## **2. STEPS FOR RESPONDING TO INITIAL SEXUAL ASSAULT DISCLOSURES**

When a student discloses to you that s/he was sexually assaulted, here are steps to follow to ensure that the student receives the help s/he needs and the safety of the student and campus community are protected. The student may share with you an incident that occurred on- or off-campus, recently or in the past.

### **2.1 Specific STEPS for Campus Representatives to Follow:**

#### **STEP 1: Determine the survivor's specific needs regarding the incident.**

(Note: If the individual is in a medical and/or psychological crisis warranting immediate intervention, follow your departmental emergency procedures and/or call 911.)

For tips on responding to survivors, please refer to the appendix.

#### **STEP 2: Contact the Coordinator for Sexual Violence Prevention Services.**

The Coordinator for Sexual Violence Prevention Services (SVPS) can assist in coordinating appropriate on- and off-campus resources and services. S/he will identify a SASC to discuss options and alternatives, help identify the most appropriate resources, assist in referring to a GaDuGi SafeCenter advocate, and answer questions that may arise. GaDuGi SafeCenter advocates can be contacted by calling Headquarters Crisis Counseling Center and requesting a GaDuGi advocate. The SVPS Coordinator can be reached by contacting Sexual Violence Prevention Services, Room 400, Kansas Union, (785) 864-3600 or by visiting the SVPS offices in the Kansas Union, Room 400. **Note: If the student approaches you after business hours and needs immediate assistance, you can contact the GaDuGi SafeCenter, KU Public Safety Office, Lawrence Police Department, and/or Lawrence Memorial Hospital, then follow up with the Coordinator the next business day.**

#### **STEP 3: Inform the individual about the difference between privacy and confidentiality.**

**Most services at KU are private, not confidential.** You can keep information private so that only people who need to know to help you deal with the incident will be given your name and other limited information as necessary. This is different from confidentiality, which means that

no information can be disclosed and your support person cannot talk and work with others on your behalf. All reports of sexual harassment made to University staff & faculty will be forwarded to HR/EO for review.

**STEP 4: Communicate the importance of medical attention and discuss if assistance is needed at this time.**

Medical attention for sexual assault survivors is vital for detecting and treating a range of medical concerns, including sexually transmitted diseases, pregnancy, and external/internal injuries. For initial medical assistance following a sexual assault, refer individuals to Student Health Services (Watkins Memorial Health Center) during daytime hours or Lawrence Memorial Hospital after 5 p.m. and on weekends.

It is important to note that when an assault has occurred within 72 hours of disclosure to the campus representative, it is essential that the survivor be made aware of the option for emergency medical care and/or collection of evidence (to assist in judicial procedures). If they are considering filing a police report, strongly encourage them not to shower, douche, or change clothes. They will need to complete a sexual assault exam at the hospital, and evidence will be collected from their clothes and body. If they have already changed clothes, make sure they store the clothes they were wearing in a brown paper bag – **DO NOT STORE THEM IN PLASTIC** – this will ruin any chances of collecting evidence from the clothes. If the survivor wishes to receive assistance, a Sexual Assault Service Coordinator can assist during business hours (Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.). A GaDuGi SafeCenter staff/advocate can accompany an individual for medical treatment as well as provide assistance on a 24-hour basis. If the survivor does not want immediate medical assistance, provide them with printed referral information (STEP 7).

*If the survivor chooses to report the assault to the police, all costs of the sexual assault kit that they will need to complete at the hospital will be covered – this includes prescriptions and the emergency room visit. If they do not report, they will be responsible for all medical expenses.*

**STEP 5: Communicate the importance of psychological support and discuss if assistance is needed at this time.**

**If the survivor needs or requests assistance for that business day, s/he may be referred directly to**

**When requested, the Sexual Assault Service Coordinator can facilitate this process.**

**If immediate intervention appears necessary** (due to extreme distress or concerns raised about the student's safety or the safety of others, including suicide threats and difficulty controlling anger), call the following numbers:

**In an emergency or after business hours -**

KU Public Safety Office.....911(if calling from an on-campus phone)  
or 785-864-5900 (if calling from off-campus phone)

If immediate assistance is not needed or requested, a Sexual Assault Service Coordinator can assist in coordinating services or can provide printed referral information (STEP 7).

**STEP 6: Communicate the importance of reporting the crime.**

The Sexual Assault Service Coordinator is knowledgeable about various reporting options and can inform the survivor of those that are available for her/his particular situation as well as appropriate contact information.

**The following are existing options for notifying officials about the incident:**

**Filing a criminal report** involves filing a formal charge with a campus or local law enforcement agency for the purpose of taking action and/or seeking redress through the criminal legal process/justice system. Crimes that are committed on campus property are reported to the KU Public Safety Office (KUPSO) and crimes that occur off-campus are reported to the Lawrence Police Department (LPD). Formal reports of crime to any law enforcement agency are logged daily in the police log, which may be accessed by area media. Information regarding the identification of the survivor is always withheld from the media.

**Filing a confidential report** involves notifying the KU Public Safety Office about an incident for informational purposes without taking action. These reports cannot be accessed by the media and will not be acted upon unless they are converted to a criminal report. Converting a confidential report to a criminal report can be done within the statutory limits, which is five years after the assault has occurred in the state of Kansas.

**Filing a grievance** involves reporting the incident to the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success and/or the Department of Student Housing as a possible violation of the University Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities and/or a student's housing contract. University offices have no means of processing evidence, so it is not necessary to preserve or present evidence when filing a grievance.

**Filing a complaint** involves reporting the incident to Human Resources/Equal Opportunity Office (HR/EO) if a faculty or staff member is the accused. If a student reports an assault by a faculty or staff member to any other faculty or staff member, that faculty/staff member must contact Human Resources to report it. However, the survivor does not have to take any action if they do not wish to do so. University offices have no means of processing evidence, so it is not necessary to preserve or present evidence when filing a grievance.

**Filing an anonymous report** involves completing a form, available through a GaDuGi SafeCenter advocate/staff, detailing an on- or off-campus sexual assault incident, regardless of the date of occurrence. No action will be taken on an anonymous report, but it can be used if the survivor wishes to file a criminal report at a later date within the 5-year statute for pressing charges. For specific information on this process, contact the GaDuGi SafeCenter.

**STEP 7: Provide information/resources to the survivor.**

Supplies of printed information are available through the Emily Taylor Women's Resource Center and are available at many campus locations. Information is also available for printing on the Emily Taylor Women's Resource Center website: <http://www.etwrc.ku.edu>.

**2.2 Campus Notification Process**

Campus representatives understand that sexual assault can be a traumatic, demoralizing experience. With this in mind, when incidents are reported, they are handled with sensitivity and care. When it is determined that university officials need to be notified of the incident to protect the safety of the student(s) involved and/or the campus community, notifications will proceed as described below.

As mentioned earlier, sexual assault is considered a form of sexual harassment. This requires campus representatives to report incidents occurring on campus property to the Human Resources/Equal Opportunity Office (HR/EO). HR/EO representatives will then follow up and investigate the claim that has been reported to ensure that students and the university community as a whole are protected from future harm.

A. Notification Based on Initial Contact

1) **If the survivor initially contacts the KU Public Safety Office**, officers and staff will follow KU Public Safety Office notification procedures and will immediately notify a representative from the Office for the Vice Provost for Student Success and HR/EO. The representative will contact the Coordinator for Sexual Violence Prevention Services and other units on a need-to-know basis.

2) **If the survivor initially contacts a Sexual Assault Service Coordinator (see 1.1 – Definitions)**, the Sexual Assault Service Coordinator will contact the SVPS Coordinator, who, in collaboration, will determine necessary and appropriate notifications, including KU Public Safety Office, HR/EO and a representative from the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success. The representative will proceed as described in 1) above and determine the necessity of notifying university officials about the incident.

3) **If the survivor initially contacts a campus representative other than those listed above**, the campus representative will contact the SVPS Coordinator, HR/EO and/or KU Public Safety Office to provide the information necessary to protect the safety of the student(s) involved as well as the campus community. The Coordinator or KU Public Safety Office representative will provide necessary information (of a generic nature only) to the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success for record-keeping purposes (for more information on record keeping, see 3.3 below) and may notify other offices as needed.

#### B. Notification to Campus

1) When notification to the campus community regarding the incident is considered essential to protect the safety of campus community members, the KU Public Safety Office will initiate and coordinate these efforts.

The Clery Act requires that the university community receive “timely reports” of “crimes considered to be a threat to other students and employees”. It goes on to state that “such reports shall be provided to students and employees in a manner that is timely and will aid in the prevention of similar occurrences.” The KU Public Safety Office will use KU Crime Alerts to accomplish this task.

In situations where KU Public Safety Office officials determine that a KU Crime Alert needs to be issued regarding an incident of sexual assault, the alert will contain information from crime reports and other sources, such as other University departments, if applicable. The production and distribution of the alert will be the responsibility of the KU Public Safety Office. No information regarding the identification of the survivor will be used in the alert or be released to the public or media. Whenever possible, the survivor will be notified of the issuance of a KU Crime Alert regarding the incident.

2) The campus community will be notified on a yearly basis of the number of sexual assaults formally reported to the KU Public Safety Office, as well as other crimes reported. This information is also available online at <http://www.ku.edu/~kucops/>. Crime statistics are also submitted to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation in accordance with existing procedures.

### **2.3 Campus Reporting Process**

Federal law mandates that KU report statistics concerning some criminal offenses, including those of sexual assault. This includes offenses that occur on or adjacent to campus or occur at university-sponsored events. The University’s mechanism allows for university representatives to anonymously report an incident through the Crime Statistics Report Form. Information collected is of a generic (non-specific, non-identifiable) nature only. The Form is available electronically on the web page of the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success at (<http://www.vpss.ku.edu/cleryact/csrform.shtml>). Reporting incidents as they occur is most helpful. However, if this is not possible, reports for the current calendar year are due by January 30<sup>th</sup> of the following year.

### **3. SERVICES FOR SURVIVORS**

#### **3.1 Philosophy of Service Delivery**

One of the most frightening, traumatic aspects of being sexually assaulted is the feeling of total helplessness and lack of control that survivors commonly experience. With this in mind, it is essential that campus representatives assist survivors in regaining control of their lives. Sexual assault survivors should be encouraged as much as possible to make their own decisions and choices following a sexual assault. It is **not** the function of any campus representative to urge a particular course of action upon the survivor of a sexual assault. Instead, the duties of the representative are to make the survivor aware of the available options and alternatives, to aid the survivor in making an informed decision as to a course of action, and to provide resources to assist the survivor in following through on decisions. Representatives should not take any action based upon a subjective evaluation as to the merit of any charges made, nor should they attempt to convince the survivor that any course of action is preferable to another. Campus and community services are available to survivors regardless of whether or not they choose to report the incident to law enforcement officials.

#### **3.2 Privacy: Guidelines and Limitations**

In the handling of sexual assault cases, every effort is made to handle information with sensitivity and care. While it is essential that campus representatives honor the choices of the survivor, there are instances where it is the University's ethical and legal responsibility to disclose information regarding the circumstances related to a specific incident. Disclosure of this information is made in accordance with law, University policy, and the provisions of the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act relating to the privacy of student records. Questions regarding privacy should be referred to the KU Office of the General Counsel (785-864-3276).

#### **3.3 About the KU Sexual Assault Services**

The KU Sexual Assault Service Coordinators (SASCs) provide assistance, information, resources, and support to ensure that members of the KU community who have been sexually assaulted have been informed of the critical services and resources available to facilitate the recovery process. SASCs assist in identifying appropriate resources, discussing options, facilitating connections with agencies/services with which the survivor may need to interact, and assisting the survivor in negotiating campus policies and procedures. The purpose for providing this centralized coordinating function is to ensure that survivors receive accurate, up-to-date information to make the process for obtaining assistance efficient and streamlined and to limit the need to repeat the telling of one's experiences to a large number of university and/or community representatives.

Sexual Assault Service Coordinators work collaboratively with the GaDuGi SafeCenter to provide a full range of services to the survivor. The GaDuGi SafeCenter, a community agency funded by the United Way and KU Student Senate, provides no-cost, confidential 24-hour hotline counseling; hospital, law enforcement, and court accompaniment; advocacy services; and individual assistance.

### **Specifically, the Sexual Assault Service Coordinator:**

1. Provides emotional support and assistance in helping a survivor identify existing needs (e.g., medical, legal, psychological, and academic assistance).
2. Identifies appropriate campus and/or community services to provide necessary assistance and serves as a liaison to those services as requested by the survivor.
3. Explains the options and alternatives available to the survivor, including obtaining medical and counseling assistance, obtaining a trained advocate, filing a police report and/or pursuing legal remedies, pursuing disciplinary actions available within the University, and obtaining academic assistance.
4. Provides follow-up with the survivor to determine if services have been obtained and have met the survivor's needs.
5. Acts as an educator about rape and sexual assault.
6. Provides information, support, and referrals to significant others, family, and friends when requested in order to address their concerns and facilitate the survivor's recovery process. (Note that specific information related to a case will not be shared.)

The Sexual Assault Service Coordinator is intended as a central referral source for information relating to the rights, options, and services available to a sexual assault survivor. **It is not the role of the Sexual Assault Service Coordinator to provide specific or detailed legal, medical, or psychological guidance to a survivor. In addition, the Sexual Assault Service Coordinator will be mindful of the unique role provided by the Sexual Assault Service Coordinator and the GaDuGi SafeCenter and will make efforts to complement rather than duplicate services.**

To protect the privacy of sexual assault survivors, written information and records regarding the case are of a generic (non-specific, non-identifiable) nature only.

### **3.4 Ongoing Evaluation of Campus Rape and Sexual Assault Services**

The Sexual Assault Response Plan/Policy is periodically reviewed by a committee of several representatives from the university and community. This group is called together by the SVPS Coordinator and will provide ongoing evaluation of campus rape and sexual assault services, as needed. This group may also discuss sexual assault-related issues and concerns impacting the KU community, including current trends and concerns on campus, issues arising related to service delivery and assistance to survivors, and mechanisms for enhancing collaboration on educational programs related to these issues.

## APPENDIX

### HELPING SOMEONE WHO HAS BEEN RAPED OR SEXUALLY ASSAULTED

- Believe them. People rarely lie about rape or assault.
- Listen to and concentrate on understanding their feelings.
- Allow them to be silent; you don't have to talk every time they stop talking.
- Ask how you can help.
- Don't ask questions that imply that the rape was their fault, such as "Why did you go to his room," "Why didn't you scream," or "Why didn't you run away?"
- Offer to accompany them in seeking medical attention, counseling, or in going to the police.
- Help them regain a sense of control. Support them in making decisions about how to proceed.
- Don't tell them what to do. Help them explore the options but let them decide what they want to do.
- Remind them that rape is the rapist's fault, not the victim's.
- Offer shelter or companionship so they don't have to be alone.

Immediately after a rape, you and the survivor should consider doing the following:

- Ask for a **GaDuGi SafeCenter** Advocate through Headquarters at 785-841-2345;
- Get medical attention;
- Notify the police.

## CRIME STATISTICS AND RELATED INFORMATION

### **Preparing the Annual Safety Report**

Crime statistics that are provided in this annual report are based upon incidents reported to the KU Public Safety Office (KUPSO), Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success, and the Department of Student Housing. Each year a variety of offices are asked to provide information on the educational and prevention programs conducted during that calendar year. The Department of Student Housing and the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success keep count of disciplinary referrals made from across the university. The KUPSO provides crime statistics for criminal offenses occurring on the Lawrence campus. In addition, the KUPSO

gathers applicable crime statistics for non-campus locations from the law enforcement agencies which have jurisdiction over those locations. The Lawrence Police provides crime statistics for crimes reported at fraternities and sororities, as well as crimes reported on public property surrounding campus.

Each year an e-mail notification is sent to all faculty, staff, and enrolled students to inform them of the University's Annual Security Report website. Annual notice is also in the employee electronic newsletter, *The Oread*. Prospective students are provided the Annual Security Report website address within the View Book and on Admissions website. HR/EO provides notification to prospective employees in the online application process. Copies of the report may also be obtained at the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Success, 133 Strong Hall or by calling 785-864-4060.

## Definitions of Reportable Incidents and Locations

### Offense Type

As defined by *FBI Uniform Crime Reporting/National Incident Base Reporting Board Standards*

**Manslaughter:** The killing of another person through gross negligence.

**Forcible Sex Offenses:** The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against a person's will; or not forcibly or against that person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

**Non-Forcible Sex Offenses:** Sex offenses-non-forcible (unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse) incest and statutory rape.

**Robbery:** Taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or putting the victim in fear.

**Aggravated Assault:** An unlawful act by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by a weapon or by aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

**Burglary:** The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft.

**Arson:** Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle, or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

**Motor Vehicle Theft:** The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

**Hate Crimes:** Under the Clery Act for an incident to be considered a hate crime, it must be a component of one of the following crimes: murder, manslaughter, a forcible sex offense, a non-forcible sex offense, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, arson, motor vehicle theft, larceny-theft, simple assault, intimidation, and destruction, damage, or vandalism of property. There must be objective evidence that the victim of these listed crimes was chosen on the basis of actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, or disability.

The U.S. Department of Justice defines hate crimes as “a criminal offense committed against a person, property, or society that is motivated, in whole or in part, by the offender’s bias against a race, religion, disability, sexual orientation, or ethnicity/national origin”. Before a crime is classified as a hate crime, there must be sufficient, objective facts that indicate that the offender’s actions were motivated, in whole or in part, by bias.

**Drug Violations:** Violations of State and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (demerol, methadones); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine).

**Liquor Law Violations:** The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

**Weapon Law Violations:** The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned acts.

## **LOCATION**

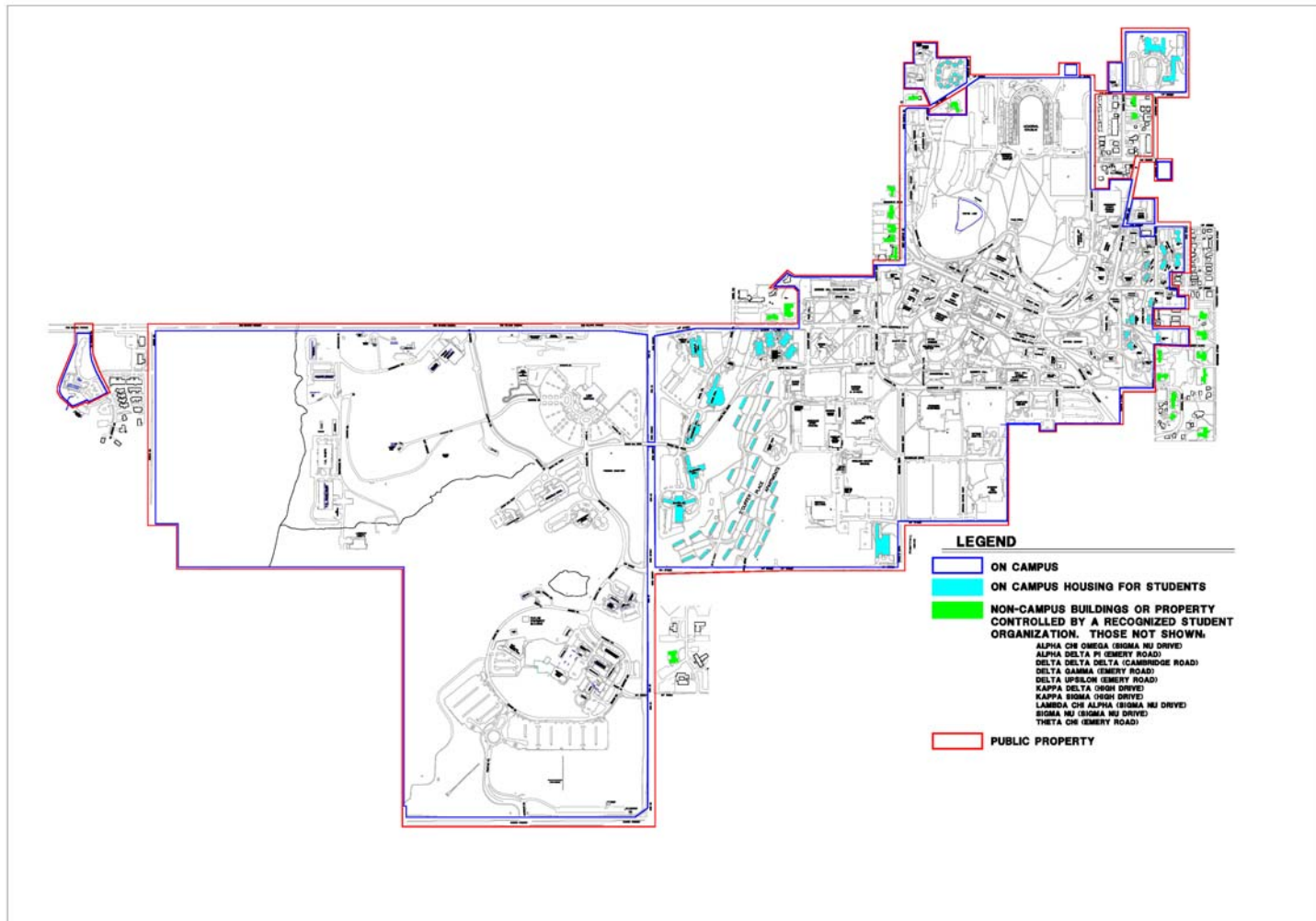
**Property:** Any building or property owned or controlled by the University of Kansas, within the same reasonably contiguous geographical area of the institution and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls. It also includes property within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or other retail vendor).

**Residential Facility:** Those buildings operated by the KU Department of Student Housing.

**Non-Campus Building or Property:** Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization, such as a fraternity or sorority, recognized by the institution and any building or property (other than a branch campus) owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is used by students and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

**Public Property Adjacent to Campus:** All public property that is within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution, such as a sidewalk, a street, other thoroughfare, or parking facility, and is adjacent to a facility owned or controlled by the institution if the facility is used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to the institution's educational purposes.
